

Executive Summary

2016-2017

The 2016-2017 academic year was a busy and exciting time for Mercy College with a record enrollment in fall 2016 of 1352 students. This is an 8.7% increase from fall 2015. The increase is especially significant because enrollment at many colleges and universities was declining during the same time period.

The top five counties from which Mercy College attracted students remained the same: Lucas, Mahoning and Wood counties in Ohio and Monroe and Wayne counties in Michigan. Overall, the online student population grew by 43% with students from 31 states participating in online programs. Mercy College's reach extended from coast to coast with the Bachelor of Science in Medical Imaging drawing students from the most states.

Youngstown had a 13% increase in enrollment attributed mostly to the growth in the Evening Associate Degree Nursing program.

Enrollment in land-based programs in Toledo was unchanged from the previous year. The program with the largest enrollment was the Bachelor of Science in Nursing (Pre-Licensure).

The demographics of Mercy College students, such as average age (28), gender distribution (86% female), and distribution by race/ethnicity (77% white) remained constant from the previous year.

Over \$13 million in financial aid (grants, scholarships, work study, loans, and outside assistance) was documented by the Financial Aid Office. All sources of financial aid increased over the previous year. While funded scholarships increased significantly, the amount dispersed (\$92,700) is less than 1% of all financial aid. The audited financial statements indicated that $Total\,Support\,and\,Revenue$ was greater than $Total\,Expenses$. Of note, total revenue was up 6% and total expenses were down 4.8% compared to the prior year.

The retention rate from fall 2016 to fall 2017 was 75%. There was a 50% increase in the number of bachelor's degrees and a 21% increase in the number of both associate degrees and certificates awarded. Licensure and registry pass rates for all programs met or exceeded the outcomes for each program.

Thanks go out to all faculty, staff, and student who had an impact on enrollment, retention and pass rates.

Overall, the data for Academic Year 2016-2017 presents a positive picture of Mercy College of Ohio.

RETENTION

The overall retention rate from Fall 2015 to Fall 2016 was 75%. The retention rate was calculated based on students enrolled in Fall 2015 who did not earn a degree or certificate during the Academic year from Fall 2015 through summer 2016. The previous year-to-year retention rate was 76%.

STUDENT HOUSING

Student housing was leased through the Historic Hillcrest Apartments with accommodations for up to 50 students or 4% of the student population. Thirty-two (32) students resided in student housing during 2016-2017.

ENROLLMENT

Mercy College experienced a 5.2% increase in student full-time equivalent enrollment from Academic Year (AY) 2015-2016 (986 FTEs) to Academic Year 2016-2017 (1,036.9 FTEs).

A Full-Time Equivalent student, FTE, is a unit of measurement intended to represent one student enrolled full-time. An average full-time student takes 30 credits in an Academic Year. Therefore, total credit hours for the year are divided by 30 to calculate the number of FTEs for the Academic Year. The Academic Year 2016-2017 is comprised of the terms Fall 2016, Spring 2017 and Summer 2017.

CHART 1: RESIDENT STATES OF STUDENTS 2016-2017





CHART 2: TOP 5 COUNTIES OF RESIDENCE FOR FALL 2016 STUDENTS





FALL HEADCOUNT

In fall 2016, Mercy College, Toledo, Ohio experienced an 8.7% increase from fall 2015.

Courses are offered at the Toledo location, the Youngstown location and online. Students in online programs take all classes online. Students in land-based programs may also take some classes online. The counts in the chart are based on the program in which the student is enrolled.




CHART 3: ENROLLMENT TREND BY PROGRAM "LOCATION"

Online students are students in the B.S. Nursing Completion, B.S. Healthcare Administration and B.S. Medical Imaging programs. The A.S. in Health Information Technology and the Certificate of Medical Coding were offered only as online programs beginning Fall 2015.

Youngstown students are students at the Youngstown location in the A.S. Nursing program. Students at the Youngstown location designated as "pre-nursing" are included in the counts beginning Fall 2015. Up to and including Summer 2015, Youngstown students were only enrolled in the Day program. The Evening/Weekend program began Fall 2015.

Toledo Land students are all students not included in the above categories: B.S. Biology, B.S. Nursing (Prelicensure), A.S. Cardiovascular Technology programs, A.S. General Studies, A.S. Nursing - Toledo Day and Evening, A.S. Radiologic Technology. Students in the A.S. Health in Information Technology and all Certificate programs are included in the count of Toledo Land students for Fall 2012 through Fall 2014. Students in Certificate programs other than Medical Coding are included for Fall 2015 and Fall 2016.

HEADCOUNTS BY MAJOR

The table below represents each semester's enrollment by major. A specific number of students will be represented by the same bar length in each column, e.g., the length of the bar for B.S. Nursing Completion students in the Fall semester (85 students) is the same length as the bar for A.S. in Nursing (Toledo – Evening) (86 students) in the Spring semester.

The largest enrollment category in the summer semester was pre-majors or students enrolled with the goal of being admitted to a degree or certificate program. The largest major in the fall and spring semesters was the Bachelor of Science in Nursing pre-licensure (BSNP) program with approximately 20% of the total student enrollment.



The average age of Mercy College students remained stable at 28 years during the past five years.







Calculation of Retention rate: Students who have the potential to return are those who attend a semester and do not graduate before the same semester the following year. The Retention Rate compares (a) the number of students who return the following year to (b) the number of potential returning students.

Retention Rates, as shown in Table 9, are at or above the 75% retention metric.



CHART 6. BACHELOR OF SCIENCE DEGREES EARNED




Compared to Academic Year 2015-2016 (121), Mercy College granted 50% more Bachelor of Science Degrees in Academic Year 2016-2017 (181).

CHART 7: ASSOCIATE OF SCIENCE DEGREES EARNED



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




CERTIFICATES (CREDIT-BEARING)

CHART 8: CERTIFICATES EARNED




Compared to Academic Year 2015-2016 (38), Mercy College granted 21% more Certificates in Academic Year 2016-2017 (46). One-third, or 3 of the 9, Ophthalmic Technology Completers were from the Youngstown area.

Graduates and Completers

Academic Years 2006 - 2016

In Academic Year 2011-2012, there were a greater number of students who completed both an Associate of Science in General Studies degree and a Bachelor of Science degree within the same year. The greatest number of degrees were conferred in 2012 because many students completed two degrees. Since the 2011-2012 academic year, the College has seen greater numbers of graduates, but the number of degrees conferred has decreased because students no longer are graduating with two degrees.

Completers: all students who finish a program of study, including Bachelor and Associate degrees. Students who complete a Certificate are not Graduates; they are Completers.



Graduation Rates

According to the United State Department of Education, graduation rates are based on degree completion within 150% of time for specified completion of the degree. The percentages for each academic year in Table 10 represent the percentage of the students who started the degree listed on the left during the Academic Year at the top of the table and completed within 150% of degree completion time. For example, a student completing a six-semester program would have nine semesters to complete the degree and be counted in the 150% completion rate.
